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Breaking Open the Word

THE HEART OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today's Feast celebrates the universality of our catholic world. We know from the *Book of Acts* and Paul's letters that Peter and Paul struggled to come to an agreement as to their respective missionary focus. For Peter it was to the Jews; for Paul, to the non-Jewish, Gentile world. While both retained their Jewish identity, they saw that God's commitment of love was to all and not restrictive to one cultural or religious grouping.

Matthew's Gospel affirms the role of Peter as the foundational disciple, the 'rock' (in Greek, 'Petros'), for the fledgling Jesus movement. But this is preceded by the most important and essential characteristic of discipleship and leadership within this movement: a firm witness of Jesus as God's anointed one, the 'Son of the living God.' Peter's affirmation of Jesus' identity comes from God. It is a statement of faith upon which the Jesus movement is built.

Faith lies at the heart of discipleship; witnessing to Jesus' relationship to God precedes any form of leadership. Peter is portrayed in Matthew's Gospel as a flawed, even failed disciple (and leader). We are only too aware today of the failings in ecclesial leadership. However, relationship with Jesus, the one from God, is what sustains and enables the 'rock', that firm foundation, to carry the Church through into a future that is uncertain.

SAINTS PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES



FIRST READING Acts 12: 1-11 **A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.** Now I know it is indeed true: the Lord has saved me from the power of Herod.

King Herod started persecuting certain members of the Church. He beheaded James the brother of John, and when he saw that this pleased the Jews he decided to arrest Peter as well. This was during the days of Unleavened Bread, and he put Peter in prison, assigning four squads of four soldiers each to guard him in turns. Herod meant to try Peter in public after the end of Passover week. All the time Peter was under guard the Church prayed to God for him unremittingly.

On the night before Herod was to try him, Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, fastened with double chains, while guards kept watch at the main entrance to the prison. Then suddenly the angel of the Lord stood there, and the cell was filled with light. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him. 'Get up!' he said 'Hurry!' - and the chains fell from his hands. The angel then said, 'Put on your belt and sandals.' After he had done this, the angel next said, 'Wrap your cloak round you and follow me.' Peter followed him, but had no idea that what the angel did was all happening in reality; he thought he was seeing a vision. They passed through two guard posts one after the other, and reached the iron gate leading to the city. This opened of its own accord; they went through it and had walked the whole length of one street when suddenly the angel left him. It was only then that Peter came to himself. 'Now I know it is all true,' he said. 'The Lord really did send his angel and has saved me from Herod and from all that the Jewish people were so certain would happen to me.'

Unity in Diversity - Fr Peter Varengo

Picking up from Jesus' goodbye injunction to go and make disciples of all nations (Acts 1:11) Luke's Acts of the Apostles become the diary of the early Christian community focusing around two specific personalities on a wandering journey from Palestine to Rome each disclosing a unique historical, theological and spiritual character as the stones and its durable supporting beams of faith of that fledging faith community. Peter was not called by Jesus out of his fishing game to mind sheep because of his personal merits, and Paul was the indomitable zealot hell-bent on upholding the orthodoxy of the Jewish tradition by eradicating totally the very notion of Christ and Christianity from among the first believers. The two characters could not be more unlike each other, and yet their diverse life journeys and their combined energy gave the primary impetus and became the prototype of solidity and unity in diversity for Christian culture. They complement each other perfectly giving solidity and authenticity to the Church as a community of believers energised by God.

With their personal individuality, Peter and Paul together represent the diverse duality of articulation and preciousness of the Church not just as a memory of cohesion in mission and death, but as the first living symbols of universality in diversity within the community of believers for us today and all time. The combined memory of St Peter and St Paul embodies both *primary simpetus* and *unity in diversity, energy* and preciousness of the believing community down the centuries and for all time. By those two elements in confluence, they incarnate a universality that embraces and transcends every culture, philosophical or theological stance, or style of lived commitment.

Christian faith is not an intellectual assent to an academic propositions but a life we face each day regardless of personal failures or communal mistakes lived through the recognition and acceptance of God's living and active presence in in our individual and/or collective story. The Church revealed by Peter and Paul is not an exclusive sect shaped by culture or nationality, but of the life-giving multi-dimensional gift enlivened by the Spirit-Energy of a Father-God to all people throughout the human story.

Faith does not obliterate human fragility, unfaithfulness or sinful denial but as a Church community, we show the world that in our brokenness and in weakness it is humanly possible, both individually and communally to be faithful to God and to live with each other and with the whole world by his love, even at the cost of weakness, infidelity and death. Whoever or wherever we may be, in their weakness and brokenness Peter and Paul today challenge us to become harbingers and foundation stones of God's presence in the world for the salvation of humanity from death, sin and brokenness world-wide, personally and communally together as one.
