Service, not Control

Misunderstanding is the keynote of Mark's Gospel, and today's narrative clearly bears this out. The disciples repeatedly not only misconstrue their understanding of Jesus and his message, but unashamedly seek to control their own misconceptions of call and belonging to discipleship. In response, honing on the less palatable, unwanted, and unexpected demands of faith, Jesus is bluntly realistic and unquestionably honest proposing a cup of submission, service, suffering, and death as the only possible way to fullness of life. To people who are exclusively inward-looking and self-centred Jesus demands a complete conversion of heart and mind into an outward-looking stance and total commitment to others in service and availability.

There is absolutely no doubt that the disciples believed in Iesus and readily claimed to be his followers. a following seemingly conditional to the achievement of their personal agenda, an instrument of upward social mobility affording them power and authority over the others. Like them, in all of us there is an innate drive to seek promotions, personal opinions, and status, ensuring our agenda by controlling self, others, and possibly God too. However, as followers of Jesus gathered here to express and celebrate the active presence of God in our lives, the challenge of the Word of God is clearly addressed to our faith scenario. We pray daily to the Father to forgive us our sins, but we will never get over that disagreement of years ago. because that gives us superiority over the offender, a psychological and moral control over that person. On the contrary, Faith is the antithesis of control and discipleship, the incarnation of trustful abandonment to God through service on behalf of those around us, whatever the cost. Faith in Jesus means to resolve the contradictions of our world and of our personal life, not in control but in self-giving to each other in a total outward and other-centred movement towards those we encounter or live with.

After a life totally other-oriented, Jesus gave up control of his very life into the hands of the Father and death became the moment of fullness of life for all of us. Our claim to faith celebrated in Word and Sacrament will be true and fruitful when the 'Amen' at the end of liturgy is not a conclusion of a ritual dispensed with for another week, but a commitment to incarnating in real-life our belief in a God who came *not to be served but to serve, and to give his life ransom for many* (Mk 10:45).

May our faith, nourished and expressed at our Sunday gathering, never be self-centred inward-looking but always projected outward into total commitment to others through service, availability and sincere mutual love, particularly when it is not easy to understand the rationale of loving service and even more difficult to live it in the concrete situations of every day.

This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Breaking Open the Word

BEING SERVANT AND SLAVE

Our first reading is from the fourth 'servant song' or poem of Isaiah. The imagery of the suffering servant is juxtaposed with 'the Son of Man [who] came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as ransom for many.' Just prior to today's Gospel reading, there was the third passion prediction. Jesus and the disciples are on the way to Jerusalem toward his passion and death. James and John, sons of Zebedee, open the scene. They were among the first called by Jesus and they are among the closest of his companions. What might we think would be on their minds? How taken aback will we be when they come to Jesus and say: 'we want you to do for us whatever we ask.' They are looking for their reward in places of esteem and honour. The brothers failure to understand angers the other ten.

Jesus makes clear that their orientation and that of anyone who wishes to be great is to be servant. This is their lesson and ours. Still today this is countercultural. In our Church we are invited to walk the way in synodality: praying together, listening deeply to one another, listening to the Spirit, walking together in the Spirit, asking what we are called to do, not only what Jesus will do for us. How will we be servant to one another, walking together in humility, this week?


