'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him, 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

#### **'LET ME SEE AGAIN'**

This week's Gospel is the story of Bartimaeus, a 'blind beggar'. Earlier in the Gospel (8:22-26) there is another healing story of a blind man in Bethsaida. These two stories bookend the journey of the disciples with Jesus toward Jerusalem and the three passion predictions. Last week we heard of the sons of Zebedee who, like the other disciples, fail to see who Jesus is. In today's story, Bartimaeus is named and connected to a family, which is unusual for healing miracles.

Bartimaeus is sitting alongside the road, the way. Jesus, the crowd and disciples are leaving Jericho on the way to Jerusalem. Bartimaeus shouts out asking for mercy, addressing Jesus as 'Son of David'. He recognises him as Messiah. Many order him to be silent. He shouts the same phrase more loudly. Jesus stops in his tracks and invites the crowd to call Bartimaeus to come to him. They say 'Take heart, get up, he is calling you'. Jesus' reconciles the many to their mission.

Bartimaeus throws off his cloak, his means of income from begging. He springs up, coming to Jesus guided by the sound of his voice. Jesus asks 'What do you want me to do for you?' This is the question Jesus had asked the sons of Zebedee. Bartimaeus answers: 'Let me see again.' Jesus' words have immediate impact. Bartimaeus regains his sight and follows Jesus on the way: he becomes a disciple of Jesus. How clearly do we see our mission to bring others to Jesus, to spread the good news, to invite others on the way.

#### A word from our PP ...

#### From a beggar at the side of the road to a disciple along the road

Every disciple of Iesus Christ has his or her journev of faith. This weekend, we shall hear the story of Bartimaeus' journey of faith. Even though Bartimaeus was blind, it appears that he was attentive to the stories about Jesus of Nazareth that people who passed through Jericho on their way to Jerusalem shared with excitement. So, his journey of faith begins with listening to what others had to say about Jesus. He certainly would have heard of Iesus' healing power and his claim to be the Messiah. And as time went by, he seemed to have imagined lesus to be a holy man, a man from God. His imagination turned into *conviction* that Jesus could transform his life and this is evident from his immediate response when he heard that Iesus was passing by; he shouted out and said, "Son of David, Iesus, have pity on me."

We also notice that his conviction made him deter**mined** to meet Iesus and the people who tried to hush him up, could not stop him. He shouted all the louder, just to make Jesus stop and call him! He then demonstrated areat

*faith and joy* when the people told him that Jesus is calling him (it is interesting to note that the same people who scolded him and told him to be quiet, encouraged him to respond to Jesus' invitation). He 'threw off his cloak, jumped up and went to Jesus'. This act of Bartimaeus reveals how certain he was that Jesus could change his life. It also shows that he himself was willing to let go of his comfort zone (at the side of the road) and his old self; and to step into a brighter future. So, the very moment he asked lesus with trust and confidence to see again, Jesus offered Bartimaeus not only the gift of sight, but also the gift of salvation.

Finally, although, Jesus told him, "Go, your faith has saved you," Bartimaeus followed Jesus 'along the road'. Having been healed, there is a transformation that takes place in his life. He becomes a *committed* disciple. From the fact that Bartimaeus is the only person who Jesus healed is named in Mark's Gospel indicates that he would have been a prominent disciple in the early Christian community who happily **shared** with people what Jesus did to him.

Bartimaeus' amazing journey of faith - from being a blind beggar at the side of the road to a committed disciple along the road - invites us to reflect on our own commitment as disciples of Jesus Christ and the reason why we are still along the road with Jesus.

Remember, there's no such thing as a small act of kindness. Every act creates a ripple with no logical end. Scott Adams
