John initially tried to convince Jesus not to be baptised, but Jesus said "In this way we will do all that God requires". John then baptised Jesus by immersion. This marked the beginning of his

The Gate of the Year

Fr Harman, our former and much loved Parish Priest, always used the following to preach at the beginning of each year ...

"And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'

And he replied:

'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way.'

So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East."



So heart be still: What need our little life Our human life to know. If God hath comprehension? In all the dizzy strife Of things both high and low, God hideth His intention. God knows. His will is best. The stretch of years which wind ahead, So dim to our imperfect vision, Are clear to God. Our fears are premature; In Him, All time hath full provision. Then rest: until God moves to lift the veil From our impatient eyes. When, as the sweeter features Of Life's stern face we hail, Far beyond all surmise God's thoughts around His creatures Our mind shall fill.

Re-entry into the Ordinariness of our Future

The story begins with bewildered shepherds searching for a newborn child in an animal shelter and ending with kings leaving that child in a stable, journeying into an unknown future in an unknown land. A bright light shatters the darkness of the night, only to fade into a flickering star dimming away in some distant desert place. Unknown wise men offer kingly gifts. while the powerful of the world set their hearts on destroying the gift of life in innocent children. In the midst of this, the greatest contradiction of all: a fragile child is sung and acknowledged as God-with-us for all time to come. That is the secret of the Christmas season now ending. No matter what the contradictions of our lives, our God is there right in the midst of it all. No matter how dim the light around us or uncertain the future ahead, having celebrated the presence of the child-God, we can now journey with trust, because this God is journeying with us, right in the reality of our lives, with its contradictory feelings of nostalgia and yearning, of past and future, and of leaving behind and taking up again.

This is *Epiphany* (= Revelation), a Greek word encapsulating the triple dimension of every authentic faith journey:



search, celebration, and mission. Through ancient stories of kings and seers chasing a star alongside the dark thoughts of villains and murder and bearing strange gifts to an unknown new-born in a stable, the liturgy taps deeply into our daily lives and confronts us with disturbing questions, while suggesting answers.

With nothing in common with the Jewish culture or faith, gazing at millions of celestial bodies, the Magi recognized the beckoning presence of the 'King of Israel' in an apparently insignificant flickering starry sign. This led them to encounter the most ordinary and unexpected people and situations in the guise of an unknown Jewish child lying in a manger. We do not know if that met with their expectations, but whatever their belief, they recognized in that child the fulfilment of their life-quest and the life-giving presence of God journeying with them.

As the echoes of our Christmas celebrations fade, the star of Bethlehem dims away and disappears, while the Wise Men journey further into the desert and beyond, we too are called to re-enter into the ordinariness of our lives, work, and relationships. Having celebrated Christmas, we too are invited to follow the beckoning presence of our God and seek and find this God in the ordinary and unexpected. As we delve once again into the sameness and contradictions of our lives as much as into the challenge of encountering those around us, may our new journey into the year just begun be a journey of joyful discovery, faith-filled acceptance and of committed witness to God-with-us.
