Triumph and Execution

"Blessings on the King who comes! ... Crucify him! Such is the fickleness of the human heart and the result is death: a royal welcome ending with an execution like a rebellious slave or an abhorrent criminal. This is not just a Jesus-flavoured Hollywood drama of two millennia ago but an unavoidable summons to a personal decision for or against God within the fickleness and challenges of life.

Holy Week is decision-making time. Within a few days of each other, the same people of Jerusalem proclaimed in one voice *Hosanna* and *Crucify*, and the challenge must be confronted as we face the roller coaster of daily struggles and misunderstandings seemingly crushing both faith and hope into an illusion where God appears to be so far away from our painful reality. Where do we stand in that crowd calling out *Blessing* and *Crucify*?

The cross is the ultimate and crucial dilemma of faith and Palm Sunday signals a stern warning that faith is a dangerous commitment demanding an uncompromising and non-negotiable acceptance of God in our personal and collective stories. Jesus did not choose the cross because it was good nor did he embrace suffering as an end in itself, but only as an expression and an instrument of that radical *Yes* to the Father that he lived for and witnessed throughout his earthly life. Betrayed, abused and executed, Jesús walks to his death, choosing trust and abandonment to his Father, proclaiming that for the believer, the duel between life and death is the duel between fidelity to God and fickleness of the human heart.

Fidelity to God is the key to the human understanding of life both in triumph and in contradictions. When confronted and lived with trust and abandonment to God, the experience of rejection, execution, and death become a sacramental sign of encounter with God. Christianity has stood accused of making an apology of the cross by escaping from the darkest experiences into an unreal spirituality of an other-worldly reward. In Jesus, God "descended into hell" plumbing the human depth of our fears, physical and emotional torments, alienation and abandonment, pain and misunderstandings, sudden and tragic experience of death by embracing trust and abandonment to the Father. And because of that trust -filled descent into all that is evil, life blossomed anew like a flower out of the cruellest winter. The triumph of Easter is always subsequent to the execution on Friday, and the tragedy of Good Friday can only make sense through the joy of Easter Sunday.

May we be people who have the courage to shout *Hosanna* and never condemn God for the struggles of our lives! Because our God has lived the hells of humanity in full, we are now able to sing *Alleluia* even beyond and in spite of death!
