Synodal of Bishops

On the 60th anniversary of the Synod of Bishops, the Secretary General of this Vatican body Cardinal Mario Grech, has encouraged the church to understand the true meaning of synodalityreminding us that Pope Francis defined this as "the privileged way to achieve communion in the Church."

Pope Leo XIV said that he hoped that the 60th anniversary of this body "will inspire a renewed commitment to the unity and mission of the Church".

Who is our Master?

Luke 16:1–13 presents one of Jesus' most puzzling parables - the story of the dishonest manager. At first glance, it seems strange that the master commends the manager's shrewdness. But Jesus is not praising dishonesty; he's highlighting the urgency and cleverness with which worldly people pursue their goals and thus, challenges his followers to be just as intentional in living for God.

As I continued to reflect on this passage, two profound questions arose in my mind: "What happens when we do not have money? And what happens when we do not have God in our lives?"

When we don't have money, especially enough to meet basic needs, the effects ripple through nearly every part of life. It's not just about missing luxuries: it's about survival, dignity, and mental well-being. We feel vulnerable. The world becomes harder to navigate. Choices shrink and dignity can feel threatened. Yet Jesus reminds us that money is not the ultimate measure of worth. It is *a tool, not a master*. And even in scarcity, generosity and faithfulness are possible. This calls to mind the poor widow who offered two small coins - she gave more than all the wealthy combined, because she gave from the heart.

Moreover, when we live without God - whether by choice, neglect, or circumstance - the absence is more than spiritual; it touches every layer of life. We may have wealth, success, and status, but still feel empty. Without God, we lack the compass that guides us toward love, justice, and peace. We may serve money, ambition, or ego, but none of these can satisfy us fully. Jesus warns, "You cannot serve both God and money." The choice is not just about finances, it's about allegiance.

There is no doubt that we live in a world where money is necessary, but it is not ultimate. The real question isn't whether we have money, but whether money has us. Do we use it to serve others, or do we let it shape our identity?

Hence, this weekend's Gospel passage calls us to examine our hearts: Are we using what we have whether little or much - to build God's kingdom? Are we clinging to temporary treasures while neglecting eternal ones?
