### This is the Lamb of God

During Mass, we read "Lamb of God" many times. Perhaps few people understand the meaning of the phrase "Lamb of God." But when John the Baptist introduced Jesus to the Jewish people, "This is the Lamb of God," the Jews clearly understood the meaning of the words.

In the Bible, the lamb is used as a symbol for the meek and the righteous. In the parable of Judgment Day, God separated the lamb from the goats. The lamb was on the right, the goat on the left.

However, the lamb has a deeper meaning. Every year, during the Jewish Passover, each family has the custom of eating a lamb. They must choose a young lamb, under one year old, strong and without blemish. The Jews eat the Passover lamb not to celebrate the end of winter and the beginning of spring, but to commemorate the day God liberated them from Egyptian slavery.

Passover is celebrated at the beginning of spring. The Jews remember the lamb. The lamb that died so that they might live. The blood of the lamb led them out of the dark winter and into the bright spring. The blood of the lamb freed them from Egyptian slavery, bringing them to the Promised Land, where they lived in freedom.

Jesus was executed during the Jewish Passover. The Last Supper was the Passover meal that Jesus ate with his disciples. By dying during the Passover, Jesus was the Lamb of God sacrificed to save humanity.

Saint John testified that "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven and resting on him." Saint John proclaimed to the people the One they were waiting for, the One upon whom the Spirit descended, enveloping and overflowing with grace. However, behind the ordinary background of Jesus, a villager from Nazareth, the son of Joseph the carpenter and Mary, lay a hidden mystery. The humanity of Jesus is deeply immersed in God: "There is one among you whom you do not know." (John 1:26b) Therefore, to bear witness to the Lord, we must not only speak of Him through what we see and know about His outward appearance, but we must experience Him through our own lives, through our encounters and interactions with Him. In this way, the image of Jesus, who takes away the sins of the world, that we present and live, can truly meet the profound longings of our brothers and sisters in the world today.

*Lord, grant us the grace to believe in You and, through the Sacrament of Baptism, to be your lovely children. Help us to live the mystery of communion in You and to be witnesses for You in our lives today.*
